

## Foundation, Partners Announce Closure of NH Med Bank Program

Collaborative program designed to help residents gain access to necessary medications closes due to funding, lack of support

The Foundation for Healthy Communities, along with its partners Catholic Medical Center and the Manchester Community Health Center, recently announced the closure of the NH Med Bank Program due to lack of sustainable funding and medication donations.

Launched to enhance access to necessary medications by collecting unused, unexpired medications from pharmaceutical companies and healthcare facilities in NH and dispensing them to residents unable to afford their medications, the NH Med Bank began as a joint pilot project in 2012 of SeaCare Health Services and the Foundation for Healthy Communities (FHC) under a grant funded by the Endowment for Health. In December 2015, the NH Med Bank became a joint collaboration of three organizations where it was owned by Manchester Community Health Center with facility space provided by Catholic Medical Center and program management support from the Foundation for Healthy Communities.

Although the NH Med Bank was a visionary program at its inception, the environment has shifted significantly since the original concept of the program. As a result of its main medication donor, Omnicare, being purchased by CVS who chose not to continue participating in the program, NH Med Bank faced an insurmountable challenge of procuring donations due to the loss of its medication supply in mid-2017.

After efforts to replenish medication donations and secure longterm sustainability were unsuccessful, the partners made the unfortunate decision to close the program in February. The official statement announcing the closure can be found <u>here</u>.

### NH Comprehensive Cancer Collaboration Awards Funding for Multiple HPV Vaccination Projects

The New Hampshire Comprehensive Cancer Collaboration (NH CCC) has awarded \$12,000 in funding to support projects targeted to increase HPV vaccination rates in New Hampshire. On average, 130 people in NH are diagnosed with cancer every year that is likely

caused by HPV infection. Despite the availability of no-cost HPV vaccine less than half of children in NH complete the HPV vaccine series.

The NH HPV Stakeholders Working Group received funding for a pilot project to increase the rate of HPV immunization rates, focusing on dental practices. NH CCC member organizations participate in the stakeholders group, along with numerous other organizations. Matched funding of \$21,000 will be contributed from the HPV Stakeholders Group. The project, titled: Engaging Partners to Increase HPV Vaccination, will encourage dental providers, the most frequently visited healthcare providers, to give a strong, ontime recommendation for the HPV vaccine to patients and parents.

The pilot project will be concentrated in Nashua in collaboration with the Nashua Division of Public Health and Community Services. In addition, HPV vaccination educational materials will be distributed to OB/GYNs in Nashua and throughout the state. Another important part of the project is to address knowledge and misconceptions about HPV vaccination among parents.

The NH CCC also awarded funding to two NH health care providers for projects to improve adolescent HPV immunization rates. Core Physicians in Exeter and Littleton Regional Health Care will use the funds to implement evidence-based strategies to reduce missed opportunities for HPV vaccinations. These include provider prompts, standing orders for HPV vaccine and reminder-recall systems.

The HPV vaccination projects will directly support the NH CCC efforts to advance the <u>2015-2020 NH Comprehensive Cancer Control</u> <u>Plan</u> and its mission of reducing the burden of cancer, the leading cause of death in New Hampshire.



## NH Health & Equity Partnership Builds Capacity for Cultural Competence

The NH Health & Equity Partnership recently completed another round of training of trainers for the Diversity and Cultural Competence workshop, graduating 9 individuals from the 40-hour training program. The Diversity and Culture Competence Workshop is designed to provide education about culture and diversity in the workplace, as well as the tools and resources necessary for the attendees to facilitate the Diversity & Cultural Competence workshop within their own work environments.



Staff from the Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of Education, Youth MOVE NH, and the Concord Family Health Center earned certificates of completion, joining the 50+ member Trainers' Circle of facilitators who have already gone through the program.
